COME TO THE ANNUAL PURCELLVILLE GREEN EXPO – HAIL TO THE TRAIL SUNDAY, OCTOBER 20 AT THE CHAPMAN DEMARY TRAIL

PURCELLVILLE, VA, September 30, 2019—Bring your family and friends to the Chapman DeMary Trail from 1 to 4 p.m. on Sunday, October 20 for the annual Purcellville Green Expo called Hail to the Trail. This event, which is part of the Loudoun Fall Farm Tour, is free and open to the public, and fun for families, students, and scouts. Come explore this 10-acre area which is considered to be the last stand of old-growth forest in the Town, meet local environmental experts, participate in fun hands-on activities to learn about nature and the environment, help plant trees, catch creek creatures, see live animals, learn about bugs, make nature art projects, bring your plastic shopping bags to be recycled hear live music, and participate in the Town's annual Arbor Day Celebration with recognition from the Virginia Department of Forestry for the 12th annual Tree City USA designation. To limit the amount of plastic at this event, we encourage you to bring your own reusable water bottles—the Town will have water available if you need a refill.

The Chapman DeMary Trail is a 10-acre area in the Town of Purcellville that runs along the South Fork Catoctin Creek, part of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed. The area is open to the public for environmental recreation, exploration, and education. The Town of Purcellville holds the conservation easement for this privately-owned property. It is managed through a partnership among Loudoun Valley High School, The Nature Generation, the Piedmont Environmental Council, and the Town of Purcellville. The entrance for the Chapman DeMary Trail is behind the building at 205 East Hirst Road in Purcellville. Once a stop along the W&OD rail line, which has been converted to a multi-use trail from Alexandria, VA to Purcellville, the town has maintained its historic old-town feel through the restoration and maintenance of its many downtown structures, reflecting the Victorian architecture popular during the early 1900s. Today, Purcellville is the economic hub of western Loudoun County and a popular weekend destination for antiquing, equestrian activities, farmer's markets, wineries, breweries, distilleries and restaurants.
